
MEMBRA Valuing Treescapes

Thanks for joining us for this exciting MEMBRA event hosted at the University of Exeter.

During Valuing Treescapes we aim to consider how a 'rights of nature' approach to existing and new treescapes could inform their protection and further development in the UK.

Proposed outputs from this event will include a co-written report on language, ethics, and narratives that can challenge, and provide alternative models for, the utilitarian, monetised valuation of trees in the 'ecosystem services' framework.

We will explore the additional dimensions of 'value' to treescapes, and foreground the importance of language in tree description and depiction during policy recommendations on the future of treescapes.

About MEMBRA

Understanding Memory of UK Treescapes for Better Resilience and Adaptation (MEMBRA) is a UK Treescapes project that looks at the memory of trees using cutting-edge molecular biology techniques to understand how past stresses are maintained and transmitted through generations.

MEMBRA also explores how our understanding of tree memory impacts the language that describes treescapes and this influences human interactions.

MEMBRA is a unique project that brings together artists, classicists, geographers and molecular biologists that has an overall aim of improving future Treescapes.
